
KEY ACTIVITIES

The Youth Community of Practice will be supported by various types of activities and knowledge products that appeal to the youth, such as podcasts and bit-sized learnings, an active virtual youth community that keeps youth active on development issues through the VCDA and various social media. A continental youth summit involving young people from across the continent and the world could be held once a year, possibly during the annual meetings of the African Development Bank.



EXPECTED OUTCOMES

- Strategic Insights and Guidance: Youth-focused briefs and knowledge products to be disseminated on youth platforms, social media and through the African Development Bank's Youth Community of Practice, providing strategic guidance to those interested in pursuing opportunities in a particular development area.
- Cultivate "One Africa" Youth Network: Foster a pan-African youth spirit that shares a common understanding of historical issues and innovative solutions, promoting unity.
- Develop Future Workforce and Leadership: Engage young Africans in meaningful discussions and leadership roles within the CoP to boost confidence, personal growth, and active participation in decision-making.
- Enable Cross-Cultural Dialogue: Cultivate a global network of young leaders, equipping them to spearhead Africa's future through cross-continental collaboration and knowledge exchange.
- AFDB Strategic Outlook: Capture and store valuable insights from the Community of Practice to guide implementation of the Bank's new TYS.

- Policy-Informing Role: Influence key policies to be adopted by policymakers across the continent and shared with various African and international organizations.
- Strengthen ADB's Position: Position the Bank as the premier facilitator of youth empowerment in Africa by creating and nurturing a dynamic, continent-wide youth network
- Thought Leadership, Knowledge Aggregation and brokerage: Synergizing and coalescing knowledge from other Bank and Africa youth initiatives by rallying them to the dialogue table to discuss in an integrative manner the Africa Youth participation in the continent's development



BACKGROUND

Youth: The Driving Force Behind Africa's Future

The dynamic youth in Africa possess a deep understanding of the continent's realities and a determination to build an equitable, prosperous future. From diaspora entrepreneurs investing in local innovations to young climate activists and policy shapers, this generation is pioneering sustainable solutions rooted in local contexts. Their vision should inform policymaking and government actions and promote the establishment of a network dedicated to enriching skills and knowledge on the continent's challenges and opportunities.

Creating a platform for collaboration, learning, and engagement between young people and experienced professionals is essential to drive positive change in Africa. The African Development Bank recognizes the transformative impact of investing and empowering one billion Africans while enhancing workforce competitiveness and productivity. The Bank's new Ten-Year Strategy (TYS 2024-2033) highlights the importance of Africa's youth in development processes and creating decent jobs to seize Africa's demographic opportunity. The Y-CoP will position Africa's dynamic youth at the forefront of sculpting the continent's trajectory on a global stage over the coming decades. Ultimately, this paradigm shift will empower marginalized yet vital changemakers to co-own Africa's destiny.
